

#### Italy Is Now Open to All U.S. Leisure Travelers

Leisure travelers from the United States
can now travel to Italy. Starting on May
16, Delta Air Lines is making
its quarantine-free flights to Rome and
Milan available to all customers who submit to the COVID-19 testing requirements.

Delta made the announcement on May 14, following a decree issued by the Italian government stating that Italy will be expanding the availability of what it calls "COVID-tested flights" to all American passengers starting May 16. Until now, they have only been available to those traveling for approved essential reasons. Another order issued in tandem stated that travelers from Europe, the United Kingdom, and Israel no longer need to quarantine in Italy if they test negative for COVID-19.

## Marino Roncari, The Artist Among Us



work as an artist. The Club is lucky to have more than one of his paintings hanging in our Dining Room. The one he is proudest of is his oil painting "Calle Di Venezia" (left) painted in Venice, Italy. This painting is not for sale because Marino says it's not finished. Then he'll remind you that DaVinci wasn't happy with the Mona Lisa until 30 years after he started it.

Marino was born in Varese, Italy and immigrated to the US in 1982. He is a master of etching, pastels, watercolors and oils. His passion is Plein Air Painting (i.e., in the outdoors) as is witnessed by his exquisite landscapes. He mounted his first show in 1975, owned a framing and art gallery for 25 years and continues to paint the landscapes of Florida in retirement. Bravo, Marino!

#### Julie Packard's Cannoli Poke Cake

- 1 White Box Cake (not yellow) 1 14-oz can Sweetened Condensed Milk
- 1 ½ cup Ricotta Cheese
- 1½ cup Mascarpone Cheese
- 1 tsp Vanilla 1 cup Powdered Sugar
- ½ tsp Cinnamon
- Mini Chocolate Chips, as desired

Bake cake per directions on box

When removed from oven, poke holes all over cake with handle of wooden spoon

Reserve 1/2 can of Sweetened Condensed Milk and

pour the rest over the cake

Refrigerate cake for about 1 hour

Remove from refrigerator

Mix Ricotta, Mascarpone, Vanilla, remaining Sweet-ened Condensed Milk and Powdered Sugar until

Add Cinnamon. Mix until smooth

Spread mixture over cake and sprinkle Mini Chocolate Chips over cake. Dust with additional Powdered

Keep Cake Refrigerated

## Italy - Geography and History

Italy is a boot-shaped peninsula that juts out of southern Europe into the Adriatic, Tyrrhenian and Mediterranean Seas. It covers a total area of 116,350 square miles. With around 60 million inhabitants, Italy is the third most populous member of the European Union. It enjoys temperate climate in the south but can be quite cold in the mountainous north.





Due to its central location, Italy has been home to many different peoples and cultures. Its first societies emerged around 1200 BC. Approximately 800 BC, Greeks settled in the south and Etruscans arose in central Italy. By the fifth century BC, the Etruscans had created a group of states called Etruria. Meanwhile, Latin and Sabine people south of Etruria merged to

form a strong city-state called Rome.

Etruscan kings ruled Rome for nearly a hundred years. But the Romans overthrew the Etruscans in 510 BC and went on to build a vast empire. At its height in 117 AD, The Roman Empire stretched from Portugal to Syria to Britain to North Africa.

The first sole emperor of Rome, Octavian, took power in 27 BC and assumed the name Augustus Caesar. The Empire flourished for more than 400 years. Declining in the fourth century, the Empire split in two. Germanic tribes from the north toppled the last emperor in 476 AD.



In the twelfth century, Italian city-states began to rise again and grow rich on trade. The Renaissance was born and spread to the rest of Europe, bringing a renewal of science, exploration and art. Italian culture flourished, producing famous scholars and artists. Its continued influence can be seen in modern religion, culture and even Latin script. But Italy remained a patchwork of territories, some of which were controlled by foreign dynasties. Beginning in 1859, an uprising forced the foreigners out, and in 1861, the Kingdom of Italy was proclaimed.



Italy took the side of the United Kingdom and United States in World War I but was left in poverty at the war's end. Benito Mussolini and his Fascist Party rose to power promising to restore the Roman Empire. He ruled as a dictator and entered World War II on the side of Germany and Japan. He was later captured and executed.



After the fall of the Fascist regime and the end of WW II, Italy became a Republic. Italian politics and society were dominated by Christian Democracy, a broad-based political party from 1946 to 1994. Since that time, Italy has been governed as a Republic by a series of coalition governments.
