
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From the Editor

Summary of Election Rules. See Bylaws for complete Rules.

At the September Board Meeting, the Board will appoint two members in good standing to the Nominating and Election Committee. At the October General Meeting, three additional members will be added to the Nominating Committee from the floor. The NEC will seek a slate of officers to present for election. The slate is presented to the Board at their October meeting and to the membership at the November General Meeting. At the November General Meeting, any final nominees from the floor may declare their candidacy. The election will be held at the December General Meeting by secret ballot in the Columbus Room. All eligible members in good standing can vote for the election of officers. Officers will be installed at the January General Meeting.

Officers shall be elected by members in good standing at the annual membership meeting each year. Qualifications for Office: In order to run for or be elected to The Board, you must be of Italian descent. A candidate must not have a criminal conviction. He/ she must be free from any upheld Club grievances. A candidate must have attended 75% of all meetings during the months beginning with October 1 through September 30 of the following year. This 12 month period is deemed the election calendar. He or she must not have missed 3 consecutive membership meetings during this election calendar period.

Any members, current in their dues, having been a member for at least a year, and attended at least half of the current year's meetings, and with no grievances or convictions on his/her record are considered in Good Standing.

Opals for October

Opal is the birthstone for October. Most people are familiar with its color

play caused by light diffraction.

White Opals are the most common and are usually found in Australia, where it is the national gem. Red flashes within Opals will command a higher price. Natural Black Opals are the rarest making them also very valuable. Vibrant orange Opals are only found in Mexico.

Romans claimed they contained actual rainbows while Arabic lore claimed that they fell through flashes of lightning! The Opal was believed to sharpen your eyesight, bring good fortune, and also guard against blonde hair from losing its color. It's thought to be bad luck if you buy one for yourself.

They are not very durable, scoring 5.5 - 6.5 on a hardness scale of 10. They should NOT be worn every day as they can easily chip and crack and become abraded on the top. A good setting is in a pendant, but without perfume or hairspray around. Never oil an opal; they are mainly composed of water, up to 21 percent.

2 T olive oil

1 cup chopped onion

1 carrot, diced

2 stalks celery, diced

4 cloves garlic, minced

Heat oil in a Dutch oven over medium until hot. Add onion, garlic, carrot and celery and cook for 5 minutes until onion is tender.

Add tomatoes, beans, broth, parsley, basil and pepper. Bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Boil for 1 minute and simmer for 10 minutes more.

Cook pasta separately until tender. Spoon pasta into bowls, ladle in soup. Garnish with Parmesan.

From Slaughter to Acceptance: The Birth of Columbus Day

In the 1870's many southern Italians seeking employment entered the US through New Orleans. With the end of the Civil War and slavery, southern plantation owners needed hard workers and they found them in these Italian immigrants. After hours many of them worked independently fishing or farming to build their personal income, selling their products in the French Quarter, "Little Palermo" as it was known. Some became competitors to the business elite, gaining some personal wealth and status within their community.

On an evening in October 1890, Police Chief D. C. Hennessy was shot and killed as he walked through an area of New Orleans where former slaves and Italian immigrants lived. The Police Chief's dying word was supposedly "Dagos."

At this time Italians were viewed in much the same way as former slaves because of their darker complexion. Minus any real evidence or eyewitnesses, 19 prominent Italians were arrested for this crime. The evidence was scandalously weak resulting in 6 acquittals and 13 mistrials. An 1890 New York Times article described the Italian immigrants as "links in a descending chain of evolution." These same sentiments were echoed in other local and national publications, exacerbating anti-Italian discrimination all over the U.S.



In March 1891, as the defendants awaited retrial, a mob, brought to a frenzy - consider the scenes at the January 2021 storming of our Capitol - breached the jail, yelling wildly, "We want the Dagos." They not only seized those awaiting trial but others as well. Eleven Italian men were slaughtered - shot, hung and mutilated.



The Italian Ambassador brought this atrocity to U.S President Harrison, a complaint which was ignored. A strained relationship ensued between the two countries bringing about talks of war, and the respective Ambassadors were recalled. Eventually President Harrison agreed to reparations of \$25,000 per family. To further shore up the Italian American relationship, Harrison conceived a one-time National Proclamation celebrating the 400th anniversary of Columbus' arrival. Its intent was to promote a more positive image of Italian Americans throughout the US. Although places like NYC had been celebrating Columbus Day with annual parades, this was the first official act by an American President.

In 1934 the NYC Knights of Columbus pressed Congress and President Roosevelt for annual reoccurring proclamations celebrating Columbus' arrival to the New World. However, not until 1966 did President Johnson sign a bill making Columbus Day a national holiday.

Our history as Italian Americans is one of bigotry morphing into an American success story. The annual celebration of Columbus Day connects Italians to the American story. Our Italian American history is a journey from bigotry to acceptance to equality and the American dream. The death of the eleven followed by the work ethic of our predecessors has ensured Italian Americans' place in America's history. Perhaps it can be summed up in the words of Frank Sinatra who said, "I'm glad that my Dad, who was not born here, came here to make sure I was born here."
