donna ad unirsi a loro, ma, nonostante le insistenze la vecchina rifiutò. Una volta che i Re Magi se ne furono andati, essa si pentì di non averli seguiti e allora preparò un sacco pieno di dolci e si mise a cercarli, ma senza successo. La vecchietta, nota come Befana, iniziò a bussare ad ogni porta, regalando ad ogni bambino che incontrava dei dolcetti, nella speranza che uno di loro fosse proprio Gesù Bambino.

Ancora oggi durante la notte del 6 gennaio, lei continua la sua ricerca riempiendo le calze dei bimbi appese ai camini con dolcetti e giocattoli.

The term Befana derives from "Epiphany," a Greek word which means "devine manifestation."

Legend has it that on a very cold winter night, the three Magi: Baldassare, Gasparre and Melchiorre, on th long journey to get to Bethlehem to the Child Jesus, unable to find the way, asked an old woman for directions who showed them the way. The Magi then invited the woman to join them, but despite their insistence, the old woman refused. Once the Three Kings were gone, she regretted not following them and so she packed a sack full of sweets and started looking for them, but without success. The old woman, known as Befana, started knocking on every door, giving each child she met some sweets in the hope that one of them was Baby Jesus.

Even today, during the night of January 6, she continues her search by filling the socks of the children hanging from the fireplaces with sweets and toys. - Lina Decrescenzo

# How Fires End By Marco Rafala'

This book is much different than the others I have read about Italy. The story begins in 1943 and the setting is Melilli, Sicily. It includes superstitions, vendettas, revenge, heartbreak, violence and finally some redemption for Salvatore Vassallo.



After the soldiers vacate, the townspeople of Melilli celebrate. It was during the celebrations

that nine-year-old Salvatore watches his younger twin brothers playing with an unexploded mortar shell. He couldn't get to them quickly enough and they were killed. The parents are heart- broken, the family falls apart, and Salvatore attempts to destroy the venerated statue of St. Sebastian, because his faith is shattered. One horrible event after another befalls the Vassallo's. Both parents die, and the people of Melilli believe the Vassallo's are cursed.

Salvatore and his sister, Nella, leave for Middletown, Connecticut with the help of a local priest and an Italian soldier, Vincenzo. They settle in an area of Middletown called "Little Melilli" and change their last name hoping to be rid of their past. In a few years Salvatore runs into Rocco Morelli in "Little Melilli." Rocco is one of many of the Melilli, Sicily townspeople who held a vendetta against Salvatore for his attempted destruction of their saint's statue. And the story of guilt, hate, vendettas and revenge begin again.

It is only after Salvatore and Rocco both have sons of their own that the story really begins. David, Salvatore's son, finds out about their real last name. Rocco's son, Tony, finds out about the damage to the statue of St. Sebastian. Sadly, decades after the fathers' violence against one another, the violence repeats itself with the sons.

Marco Rafala' is a first generation Sicilian American. This was his first novel. You can get it from the Sarasota County Library. I highly recommend the book. It is far from the light-hearted novel, but the story kept me wanting to turn the page.

Linda Falco's Crab Stuffed Mushrooms (Appetizer for Feast of Seven Fishes)

### Ingredients

1 pound fresh large mushrooms 8 oz crabmeat 5 scallions, thinly sliced 1/4 tsp dried thyme 1/4 tsp dried oregano ground black pepper to taste 1/4 cup + 3 Tblsp grated Parmesan cheese 1/3 cup mayonnaise 1/4 tsp paprika

## Directions

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Combine crabmeat, scallions, herbs and pepper. Mix in mayo and 1/4 cup Parmesan until well combined. Refrigerate filling until ready to use.

Wipe mushrooms clean with damp towel. Remove stems. Spoon out gills and base of stems, making deep cups. Fill mushroom caps with rounded teaspoons of filling and place them in an ungreased shallow baking dish. Sprinkle tops with extra Parmesan and paprika. Bake for 15 minutes. Serve immediately while piping hot.

# **Our Italian Adventure**

**Buon** Giorno! I'd like to tell you the story of the Palmer family's two-and-a-half-year sojourn in *la Bella* Napoli. As introduction, we are Gail, George, and Tiffany Palmer, three-year IACV members, who moved to Venice to escape the Connecticut winters. We've met many of you and enjoy the Club.

Our story began in 1978 when, as a US Navy Lieutenant, I received orders to report to Submarine Group Eight in Naples, Italy, for a tour of duty as Staff Plans Officer. My job would be to watch over the subs and their crews, and send help, when they needed it, from our headquarters in Naples, as they defended our Nation against Soviet aggression.

When I announced to Gail and our two grammar-school-aged daughters that we would be moving to Naples, Italy, for over two years, they all had lots of questions. Where will we live? Where will we buy the things we need? Where will we go to school? How will we be able to speak with our neighbors when all we know is English?

We bought an Italian-English lesson book and started to learn basic phrases together, but when we boarded the plane carrying us and other military families to Italy, we were still a long way from being able to ask for directions in Italian.

I can remember the announcement our pilot made a few minutes before we landed at *Capodichino* Airport, as it if were yesterday. "Ladies and gentlemen, we'll be on the ground in five minutes. The weather in Naples is sunny and dry with a wind from the west at ten knots. Make sure you set your watches back one hundred years."

Ciao for now. Next month: How we lived with a hundred *Carabinieri* during our first month in our *Napoli* hotel.

## The Hidden Cities of Italy - Celano

A trip to Italy is always a marvelous and unforgettable adventure. Italy, a country shaped like a boot extending deep into the Mediterranean Sea, offers you spectacular cities, ancient ruins, beautiful museums, soaring mountains, great beaches, and beautiful natural scenery - all packed in one. Perfect for the bucket lists of a lot of people.

Three thousand years of history, the center of ancient Greco-Roman culture, and the inventor of the Renaissance make Italy the best country in the world. As per statistics, Italy is home to around half the world's art treasures, and as per UNESCO of 2019, home to 55 World Heritage sites. With gems like



the Colosseum in Rome, the city of Pompeii, and the glorious Amalfi Coast, it's no wonder the country receives millions of visitors each year.

In Italy, besides the well-known tourist attractions, you find much more to discover. There are hundreds of hidden towns and villages up on the mountains or along its 7,600 km (4,700 mi) coastline.

An excellent example of a hidden city is Celano, a town in the province of L'Aquila, central Italy. Here is what Gloria Ross, who just visited it, has to say.

The little towns usually are not the destinations of many tourists. The local people are not used to a significant influx of



tourísts. We were a novelty; they were staring at us with surprise and a welcome smile on their faces. My group and I felt comfortable walking through the street (vicoli), most of them with steps. We visit the castle of Celano located in the city's historic center, built in the fourteenth century by the Count of Celano, Píetro Berardí. The castle was named *Piccolomíní* in the 16th century after Antonio Todeschini Piccolomini, a nephew of Pius II, became its owner.

As of today, the castle still stands majestic in the upper part to guard the city below; solid square towers characterized this unique building, a synthesis of medieval and Renaissance elements, and is home to the Museum of Sacred Art of the Marsica and the Torlonía Collection of Antiquities of Fucino. What amazed me most, Gloría recounted, is that this Castll with secret rooms and con-



voluted courtyards sustained earthquakes and barbarian assaults for centuries, while our buildings in the U.S.A fall so easily!

But the architecture and history of Celano, Gloria continued, wasn't all that fascinated me. Also, I discovered a new culinary art. We did make pasta from semolina flour called 'cavatelli.' So delicious! It made me wonder how those simple ingredients made such a delightful mea! My surprise spiked even more when we made the ravioli, whose taste I can't describe and doing it proper justice.

Gloría concluded, The connection to this small hidden part of Italy became so intense that leaving Celano moved me to tears. I thought of all the people that for centuries have lived, loved, hoped in those houses, walked through the same paths I did, and I promised to myself that I would return to Italy for more powerful experiences.
